My first job, after my post doctoral studies in neurobiology at Cornell Medical School, was at Quark Biotech in Israel as a consultant. I was involved in identification of genetic suppressor elements.

Since both me and my husband, Dr Raja Mugasimangalam, were technocrats, setting up Genotypic's systems and processes from both organizational and service perspective were very challenging and rewarding. Every functional domain form HR-to-certifications of standards for service delivery and implementation of an ERP system were major contributions. We were (for the first time in the history of life sciences, world wide) awarded the SAP ACE 2010 award for Customer Excellence and Best Run Business for having the foresight to leverage software as a service model to support rapid growth.
