

NCBS prof wins Infosys prize in life science

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Bangalore: India-based Infosys Science Foundation has chosen Dr Satyajit Mayor, professor, cellular organization and signaling, National Center for Biological Sciences, Bangalore, India, as the winner of the Infosys Prize 2012 in the life sciences category for his outstanding research contributions. The prize for each category includes a gold medallion, a citation certificate, and prize money of over \$90,000.

The Infosys Prize, which is now in its fourth year, ranks among the highest monetary awards in India that recognizes scientific research. Dr Satyajit Mayor by a jury comprising of eminent scientists and professors from around the world and chaired by Professor Inder Verma.

Mr S Gopalakrishnan, executive co-chairman, Infosys, and president, board of trustees, Infosys Science Foundation, while speaking about the awards said that, "The ability to create, distribute, and use knowledge is a major source of competitive advantage, wealth creation, and quality-of-life improvements.
